That when you say you're not worthy or that you're not up to it or it's just time to give up or whatever you're essentially saying that Christ didn't save you. Christ couldn't save you. God isn't powerful enough. You're essentially taking control and saying I have the ability to say whether I am worthy to follow Christ or not. And the truth of the Scripture is right there. There is no condemnation for those who believe in Christ Jesus. So there is no need to condemn yourself for whatever you've done or haven't done or whatever you perceive your failings to be. Because self-condemnation can lead to self-pity. I know, I've been there. I've done it a lot. And self-pity leads to inactivity, inaction, depression, You

don't do anything. You just sit around and feel sorry for yourself. So the Lord says, "Don't do that. I haven't condemned you." He says the same thing to us he said to the woman who was going to be stoned for adultery. He looks around once everyone has realized they have no stones to throw and says, "Do you see anyone who condemns you? Neither do I. Go. Sin no more." That's what He tells us today. Don't worry about what happened in the past. I'm not condemning you for that. Just pick yourself up and keep going. Don't stop now. Don't get stuck in your own ideas of what you can or can't do or what you're worthy of. There is no condemnation in Christ Jesus.
